
PPCR Overview

Improve climate resilience of countries by using a two-phase, programmatic approach:

Phase 1: assist national governments in integrating climate resilience into development planning

Phase 2: provide additional funding to put the plan into action and pilot innovative public and

- private sector adaptation solutions
- Stakeholder engagement
- Learn-by-doing; share lessons learned
- Regional PPCRs strengthen regional cooperation





PPCR Overview





- \$1.2 billion funding
- 28 countries; 2 regional programs
- More than 70 adaptation projects of different sectoral and thematic focus

Key Principles of the PPCR Programmatic M&R



Country Ownership

- country-driven and participatory
- managed by the pilot countries
- role of country focal point is key

Use of Participatory Approach

- empowering local stakeholders and ensuring their active contribution
- allows exchange of knowledge
- ensures accountability and transparency.

Use of Mixed-Methods

- combines quantitative and qualitative methods

Learning-by-Doing

- flexibility, pragmatism, efficiency, and adaptive management





PPCR Logic Model with Indicators



Global - CIF Final Outcome

(15 - 20 yrs)

Improved climate resilient development consistent with other CIF objectives

Country – Contribution of SPCR to Transformative Impact (10-20 yrs / national level)

A1. Increased resilience of households, communities, businesses, sectors and society to climate variability and climate change.

A1.1 Change in % of households whose livelihoods have improved

A1.2 Change in losses/damages from CC/CR in PPCR areas A1.3 # of people supported by PPCR to cope with CC/CR

A1.4 % of people with year round access to water

A2. Strengthened climate responsive development planning

Country -SPCR Outcomes

In order to prepare for and respond to climate variability and climate change ...

B1. Adaptive capacities strengthened

B2. Institutional frameworks improved

B3. Climate information in decision making routinely applied

B4. Sector planning, and regulation for climate resilience improved B5. Climate responsive investment approaches identified and implemented

B1. Extent to which vulnerable households, communities, businesses and public sector use improved PPCR supported tools

B2. Evidence of strengthened government capacity and coordination mechanism to mainstream CR

B3. Evidence showing that climate information, products/ services are used in decision making in climate sensitive sectors

B4. Leverage of PPCR funding against public & private investments in climate sensitive sectors B5. Quality of & extent to which climate responsive instruments/ investment models are developed & tested

Category 1: National level

Core Indicator 1. Degree of integration of climate change in national and sectoral planning

Core Indicator 2:Evidence of strengthened government capacity and coordination mechanism to mainstream climate resilience

Category 2: Project level


Core Indicator 3:Quality and extent to which climate responsive instruments/investment models are developed and tested

Core Indicator 4: Extent to which vulnerable households, communities, businesses, and public sector services use improved PPCR supported tools, instruments, strategies, and activities to respond to climate variability or climate change

Core indicator 5: Number of people supported by the PPCR to cope with the effects of climate change .

PPCR M&R Process



7 STEPS AT THE NATIONAL LEVEL

- 1 Compose the in-country stakeholder groups
- 2 Convene a stakeholder scoring workshop
- Establish scoring criteria for indicators 1 and 2
- Establish scores for indicator 1 and 2
- Aggregate project-level data for indicators 3,4 and 5
- 6 Quality assurance
- Submit report to the CIF Administrative Unit







Stocktaking Review of PPCR M&R

Objective: To assess the relevance, effectiveness, and sustainability of the PPCR monitoring and reporting system after three years of implementation

- Documentation review
- Survey questionnaire and in-depth interview with key stakeholders
- Multi-stakeholder validation workshop





Findings from the 2017 Stocktaking Review



Successes

- The PPCR M&R system has been successful in keeping the programmatic nature of the PPCR alive.
- The participatory, country-led annual scoring workshop has provided a practical and viable platform for multi-sectoral collaboration and synergies among and beyond government actors.
- All countries reported using the system for capacity-building and learning purposes.
- Served as a mechanism for accountability
- Enabled significant uptake and utilization



Findings from the 2017 Stocktaking Review



Challenges

- Related mostly to capacity-building and implementation of the system rather than substantive criticism of its design and methodology
- PPCR countries raised a small number of technical issues and requested further guidance on certain unclear terminology and measurement criteria specific to each indicator in the toolkit.
- Overall gap in interim results in the PPCR



Next Steps

- Complementary reporting to generate project- or outputlevel indicators
- Update the toolkit; provide examples
- Develop and implement the PPCR M&R Capacity-Building and Training Initiative; CIF/MDBs to optimize their role as brokers of knowledge-sharing activities
- CIF/MDBs to accelerate efforts to invest in participatory, regional-level monitoring and reporting systems for PPCR
- Provide technical assistance to countries on systemic challenges
