DECISIONS OF CMP17, CMA4 AND COP27 RELATING TO THE ADAPTATION FUND AND THE RELEVANT MATTERS TO BE CONSIDERED BY THE ADAPTATION FUND BOARD

AFB/B.40/8

I. Background

1. At the Glasgow Climate Change Conference in November 2021, the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP) at its sixteenth session and the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA) at its third session decided to confirm that (i) developing country Parties to the Paris Agreement that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change are eligible for funding from the Adaptation Fund (the Fund); and (ii) Parties to the Paris Agreement are eligible for membership on the Adaptation Fund Board (the Board).¹ Furthermore, the CMP 16 decided: (i) regarding eligible country Parties to access funding from the Fund, to **request the Adaptation Fund Board to amend the relevant operational and policy guidelines, as well as its strategic priorities, policies and guidelines accordingly²; and (ii) with regard to the decision that Parties to Paris Agreement are eligible for Board membership, to request the Adaptation Fund Board to amend the relevant procedures and modalities**.³

2. The Board fulfilled the mandates issued under decisions 3/CMP.16, paragraphs 6 and 7, and 13/CMA.3, paragraphs 7 and 8, in 2022 by approving the amendments of the Fund's Operational Policies and Guidelines for Parties to Access Resources from the Adaptation Fund (OPG) and the Strategic Priorities, Policies and Guidelines of the Fund (SPPG) at its thirty-ninth meeting⁴ and submitting its recommendation to the CMP at its seventeenth session (CMP 17) that the CMP consider and take any action on, as it deems appropriate, the amendments to the SPPG as approved by the Board at its thirty-ninth meeting. At the Sharm el-Sheikh Climate Change Conference in November 2022, the CMP 17 noted with appreciation the work of the Board on adopting the amended OPG and welcomed the amended SPPG and adopted the amended SPPG.⁵ In addition, the CMA at its fourth session (CMA 4) noted with appreciation the work of the Board on adopting the amended OPG and welcomed the amended SPPG.⁶

3. At the Sharm el-Sheikh Climate Change Conference a number of decisions relating to and/or referring to the Adaptation Fund were made by the CMP 17, CMA 4 and COP at its twenty-seventh session (COP 27). These include: CMP 17 decisions on *the Report of the Adaptation Fund Board for 2022, fourth review of the Adaptation Fund, and Guidance relating to the Clean Development Mechanism (CDM)*; CMA 4 decisions on *Matters relating to the Adaptation Fund, Rules, Modalities and Procedures for the Mechanism Established by Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement, Matters Relating to the Work Programme Under the Framework for Non-Market Approaches Referred to in Article 6.8 of Paris Agreement, Matters relating to the Least Developed Countries, and Sharm el-Sheikh Implementation Plan.*

4. This document is to present decisions made at Sharm el-Sheikh Climate Change Conference in November 2022, by CMP 17, CMA 4, ad COP 27 relating to or referring to the Adaptation Fund and matters to be considered by the Board in response to such decisions.

II. Overview of decisions by CMP17 and CMA 4 relating to or referring to the Adaptation Fund

5. Annex to this document contains decisions by the CMP 17, CMA 4, and COP 27 which provide guidance, recommendation or mandate to the Board as well as a secretariat's proposal for actions to be taken by the Board in response to the respective decisions.

6. Regarding the Report of the Board to CMP and CMA for 2022, the CMP 17 and the CMA 4, among others:

- Welcomed the financial pledges to the Adaptation Fund, noted the outstanding pledged contributions to the Fund and urged Parties to fulfil their pledges as soon as possible;
- Emphasized the importance of continuing to take actions to promote the adequacy and predictability of adaptation finance, taking into account the role of the Fund in delivering dedicated support for adaption while inviting developed country Parties, including in the context of decision 1/CMA 3, paragraphs 16-18, to scale up their financial contributions to the Fund;
- Noted with appreciation the work of the Board on adopting the amended Operational Policies and Guidelines for Parties to Access Resources from the Adaptation Fund (OPG);
- The amended Strategic Priorities, Policies and Guidelines of the Fund (SPPG) was adopted by the CMP and welcomed by the CMA;
- Encouraged the Board to continue its work on complementarity and coherence with other multilateral climate funds to streamline access modalities for project approval and the interoperability of reporting requirements, as appropriate;
- Requested the Board to adopt a policy on a safeguarding against sexual exploitation and abuse and sexual harassment.
- 7. With respect to the fourth review of the Adaptation Fund, CMP, among others:
 - Welcomed the positive results and performance of the Fund, including its relevance, efficiency and effectiveness and recognized the comparative advantage of the Fund, including the speed of the project approval, strategic engagement of stakeholders at the subnational level, various institutional benefits, efficiency of institutional arrangements, enhancement of country ownership in the funding process, direct and regional access modalities and readiness programmes;
 - Recognized the lessons learned and progress made since the third review of the Fund, including the launch of new funding windows, the growth of the Fund's project portfolio and the update of the Fund's gender policy and evaluation policy, while acknowledging opportunities for improvement with regard to, inter alia, instruments, financial windows and knowledge management;

- Encouraged the Adaptation Fund to strengthen ongoing efforts related to promoting resilience measures, improving policies and regulation, innovation, and development and diffusion of innovative adaptation practices, tools and technologies;
- Also encouraged the Board to continue to enhance access to the Fund, including by: strengthening engagement with and support for building the institutional capacity of national implementing entities (NIEs); expediting the disbursement of approved adaptation grants; further strengthening coherence and complementarity in order to facilitate streamlining access modalities, as appropriate, including for accreditation, and scaling up Adaptation Fund projects; and further improving geographical and thematic coverage in the accreditation of NIEs and RIEs;
- Requested the Board to review and update the environmental and social safeguard policy of the Fund, as needed;
- Requested the Board to increase the gender-responsiveness of the resources provided by the Adaptation Fund;
- Invited the Board to consider ways to strengthen the engagement of the Fund with the private sector in order to increase private sector participation in adaptation action;
- Requested the Board to include in its annual report to the CMP 18 and the CMA 5 (November 2023) information on aggregated actual results of projects and programmes funded by the Adaptation Fund, in particular across the Fund's five core indicators, accompanied by qualitative analysis of successes, challenges and lessons learned.
- 8. Regarding Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement, the CMA 3, among others:
 - Noted that the levels of share of proceeds for administrative expenses contained in annex

 chapter V, are to be reviewed periodically for the sound operation of the Supervisory
 Body and *for enabling a periodic contribution of funds to the Adaptation Fund*;
 - Further noted that, for *the monetary contributions from individual Article 6.4 activities to the Adaptation Fund* in accordance with the rules, modalities and procedures for the mechanism, *the Supervisory Body agreed to deduct 3 per cent of the issuance fee* paid for each request for issuance of Article 6.4, emission reductions (6.4ERs) and *collectively transfer them annually to the Adaptation Fund*;
 - Noted that *the level of and process for monetary contributions* from individual Article
 6.4 activities *to the Adaptation Fund may be modified by the Supervisory Body* in future on the basis of its review of the implementation of the provision thereon;
 - Decided that *the level and frequency of a periodic contribution* from the remaining funds received from the share of proceeds for administrative expenses *to the Adaptation Fund shall be determined by the CMA* on the basis of annual reviews of the status of those funds;
 - Pursuant to paragraph 58 of the rules, modalities and procedures for the mechanism established by Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement (RMPs), the mechanism registry administrator shall forward 5 per cent of issued authorized Art.6.4 emission reduction (A6.4ERs) and mitigation contribution A6.4ERs in the pending account immediately to the share of proceeds for adaptation account held by the Adaptation

Fund and, if the issued A6.4ERs are authorized, shall distinguish the forwarding as effecting a first transfer. This first transfer shall be subject to a corresponding adjustment;

- The Adaptation Fund Board and its support structure shall develop and implement a strategy on monetizing A6.4ERs in the share of proceeds for adaptation account held by the Adaptation Fund in the mechanism registry, and inform the state of monetization annually to the CMA;
- Pursuant to paragraph 67(b) of the RMPs, the [UNFCCC] secretariat shall *transfer the monetary contributions from individual Article 6.4 activities as set by the Supervisory Body to the Adaptation Fund annually*;

III. Matters to be considered by the Board in response to decisions by CMP 17 and CMA 4 relating to the Adaptation Fund

9. In response to decisions of CMP 17 and CMA 4 relating to the Fund, four matters are proposed to be considered by the Board at this meeting.

(1) A policy on safeguarding against sexual exploitation and abuse and sexual harassment

10. The CMP 17 and CMA 4 requested the Board to adopt a policy on safeguarding against sexual exploitation and abuse and sexual harassment (SEAH).⁷ In response to this mandate, the Board may want to consider requesting the secretariat to prepare a document with options for a SEAH policy and present it to the Board at its forty-first meeting.

(2) Review and update of the environmental and social safeguard

11. The CMP 17 requested the Board to review and update the environmental and social safeguard policy of the Adaptation Fund, as needed.⁸ The Adaptation Fund's Environmental and Social Policy (ESP) was adopted by the Board in 2013 and amended in 2016. In response to the CMP's mandate, the Board may want to consider requesting the secretariat to conduct a review of the Fund's ESP and prepare a proposal for an update of the ESP as needed, for the Board's consideration at its forty-first meeting.

(3) A strategy on monetizing Article 6.4 Emission Reductions (A6.4ERs)

12. The CMA 4 decision on the rules, modalities and procedures for the mechanism established by Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement mandates, in its Annex I, paragraph 60 that *the Adaptation Fund Board and its support structure shall develop and implement a strategy on monetizing A6.4ERs in the share of proceeds for adaptation account held by the Adaptation Fund*

*in the mechanism registry, and inform the state of monetization annually to the CMA.*⁹ In response to this mandate, the secretariat has held consultations with the UNFCCC secretariat and the trustee after the Sharm el-Sheikh Climate Change Conference with a view to better understanding the development on the mechanism established by Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement in relation to the Adaptation Fund and any actions to be taken by the Board, its secretariat, and the trustee.

13. Summary of the secretariat's consultations with the UNFCCC Secretariat and the trustee includes the following:

- There will be three types of shares of proceeds for the Adaptation Fund under Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement:
 - (i) Paris Agreement Article 6.4 Emission Reductions (A6.4ERs; in-kind): five percent of A6.4ERs at issuance
 - (ii) Monetary contribution: (a) three percent of issuance fee paid for each request for issuance of A6.4Ers, to be transferred annually; and (b) periodic monetary contributions from individual A6.4 activities, of which level, frequency and process to be determined by the Supervisory Body
 - (iii) Transfer of eligible certified emission reductions (CERs) under CDM to Art.6.4 registry for the use of CERs towards NDCs, as a temporary measure or transitioning activities: the transfer requires host countries' approval, and the process for the transfer needs to be decided by the CMA. It's not yet clear how this affects the CERs held in the Adaptation Fund.
- A6.4ERs will be able to be issued only after the mechanism for Art. 6.4 becomes fully operational and Art.6.4 activities are registered. This may occur at the earliest, in early 2024, and more detailed rules still need to be developed by the Supervisory Body (e.g., Art.6.4. activities standards, cycle, procedure, and validation, etc.):
- As of the date of this report, it is still premature to develop a strategy for A6.4ERs as further rules and procedures need to be established to operationalize the 6.4 mechanism.

14. The Board approved the <u>CER Monetization Guidelines</u> contained in Annex IV to the report of the fourth Board meeting in March 2009.¹⁰ The <u>amended CER Monetization Guidelines</u> were approved by the Board at its seventeenth meeting in March 2012. <u>The CER Monetization</u> <u>Guidelines were amended</u>¹¹ at the eighteenth Board meeting in September 2012. <u>The</u> <u>Monetization Guidelines was amended</u> again in March 2015 to incorporate the monetization of other carbon assets to be added to the Adaptation Fund Share of Proceeds (specifically assigned amount units (AAUs) and emission reduction units (ERUs)).¹²

15. Regarding the CMA 4 mandate to develop and implement a strategy on monetizing A6.4ERs in the share of proceeds for adaptation account held by the Adaptation Fund in the

mechanism registry, and inform the state of monetization annually to the CMA, consultations with the UNFCCC Secretariat and the trustee noted that it would be premature and not feasible to develop the strategy on monetization of A6.4ERs at this moment because further rules and procedure for the mechanism for Art. 6.4 need to be developed for the mechanism to becomes operational. Accordingly, the secretariat and the trustee will continue engaging with the UNFCCC Secretariat in order to stay abreast of the development of A6.4ERs mechanism in relation to the Adaptation Fund bearing the CMA 4 mandate in mind.

16. In response to the CMA mandate on a new monetization strategy, the Board may want to consider requesting the secretariat and the trustee to continue consultations with the UNFCCC secretariat and any other relevant stakeholders with a view to developing a strategy on monetization of A6.4ERs in a timely manner and report to the Board on the status of the work at the forty-first meeting.

(4) Arrangements for the Fund's transition from the Kyoto Protocol to Paris Agreement

17. Decision 1/CMP.14, paragraph 2, states that the Adaptation Fund shall exclusively serve the Paris Agreement and shall no longer serve the Kyoto Protocol once the share of proceeds under the Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement becomes available. In this regard, the development of the Paris Agreement Art.6.4 mechanism is closely linked to the Fund's transition from the Kyoto Protocol to the Paris Agreement, and therefore, the secretariat has continued consultations with, in particular, the UNFCCC secretariat and the trustee to stay abreast of the relevant information with a view to support the Board in preparing for a smooth and timely transition of the Fund to the Paris Agreement.

18. The secretariat's consultations with the UNFCCC and the trustee that have held so far since 2019 found the following, among others:

- The term of 'becomes available' in decision 1/CMP.14, paragraph 2, which triggers the Fund's transition is not clearly defined. <u>Trustee shared its view¹³</u> at the second session of the Board meeting (June 2019) that from the trustee perspective, *"it could be envisioned that the assets would only be available for use by the Fund at such time as they can be monetized, and the proceeds allocated by the Board for concrete adaptation projects and programmes."* And this would not possible until the Terms and Conditions for the trustee services signed between the CMP and the World Bank as the trustee (T&Cs) were amended to permit this. Before amending T&Cs, the trustee would also need to take due diligence on the implications of monetizing new carbon assets);
- It would be important to harmonize the processes for the Fund's transition from Kyoto Protocol to the Paris Agreement, and clarifications may be needed whether additional decisions or guidance from the CMP and CMA are required in relation to the Fund's transition. In this regard, outlining the sequence of the processes for the Fund's transition may be beneficial to ensure the smooth and timely transition of the Fund as well as to prevent any disruption of the Fund's operations.

19. With respect to the arrangements for the Fund's transition from the Kyoto Protocol to the Paris Agreement, the Board may want to consider requesting the secretariat to continue

consultations with the UNFCCC secretariat, the trustee, and any other relevant stakeholders with a view to preparing for the arrangements for the Fund's transition from the Kyoto Protocol to the Paris Agreement in a timely manner and as per decision 1/CMP.14, paragraph 2, and report the status of the work at the forty-first meeting for the Board's consideration.

IV. Conclusion

20. Considering decisions of CMP 17 and CMA 4 relating to the Fund and the information presented above, the secretariat proposes the below recommendation for the Board's consideration.

Recommendation

21. Having considered decisions taken by the CMP at its seventeenth session and CMA at its fourth session relating to the Fund and document AFB/B.40/X and its Annex, the Adaptation Fund Board (the Board) may want to consider and decide to:

a) Request the secretariat to conduct a review of the Environmental and Social Policy of the Adaptation Fund (ESP) with a view to updating the ESP, prepare a proposal for an update of the ESP as necessary and present them at its forty-first meeting for Board's consideration;

b) Request the secretariat to prepare a document with options for a policy on safeguarding against sexual exploitation and present it at the forty-first meeting for Board's consideration;

c) Request the secretariat and the trustee to continue consultations with the UNFCCC Secretariat and any other relevant stakeholders with a view to developing a strategy on monetization of Article 6.4 emission reductions (A6.4ERs) in a timely manner and report the status of the work at the forty-first meeting for Board's consideration;

d) Request the secretariat to continue consultations with the UNFCCC Secretariat, the trustee, and any other relevant stakeholders with a view to preparing the arrangements for the Fund's transition from the Kyoto Protocol to Paris Agreement in a timely manner and as per Decision 1/CMP.14, paragraph 2, and report the status of the work at the forty-first meeting for Board's consideration.
