Announcement of new programmes and expansion of the AFCIA Partnership

*Adaptation Fund Climate Innovation Accelerator (AFCIA)

Event description

In the face of escalating climate crises in the Global South, where devastating floods, soaring temperatures, and rampant wildfires have become stark realities, the need for enhanced investment in climate adaptation and resilience is more urgent than ever. It transcends mere statistics, demanding localized, affordable, inclusive, and innovative solutions rooted in the unique challenges of the Global South. Current international adaptation financing falls drastically short, with an annual allocation barely surpassing US\$ 50 billion, while the projected adaptation needs by 2030 range from US\$ 160-340 billion and could soar to US\$ 315-565 billion by 2050. This widening gap underscores the pressing need for private investment. The imperative for innovative, local, affordable, and inclusive solutions is undeniable. Community-driven initiatives not only prove cost-effective but are tailored to the unique challenges faced in the Global South, empowering communities to construct resilience from the ground up.

We are therefore proud to announce the expansion of the Adaptation Fund Climate Innovation Accelerator (AFCIA) partnership at COP28 by addition of two new partners, the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) and the World Food Program (WFP). AFCIA is a pioneering innovation accelerator program, which aims to ignite and accelerate innovation in climate change adaptation in developing countries and generate evidence of effective solutions that can be scaled-up. Under the auspices of the AFCIA partnership, UNIDO and WFP will administer programmes that will give out small grants and technical support to a wide range of beneficiaries globally in the amount of US\$ 20 million.

The accelerator was first announced by the Adaptation Fund at the United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP25) in Madrid in December 2019 and launched in November 2020 by AF together with UNDP and UNEP/CTCN. The event will bring together high-level policy makers, industry leaders, investors, entrepreneurs, and key stakeholders to discuss how AFCIA accelerates innovation in climate adaptation.

Key objectives of the event:

- Championing the mission of the Adaptation Fund, UNIDO and WFP in catalyzing innovation in climate adaptation.
- Unveiling two AFCIA initiatives implemented by UNIDO and WFP worth US\$ 20 million.
- Showcasing innovative climate adaptation entrepreneurs

Mikko Ollikainen, Head of the Adaptation Fund

Mikko leads the Fund's secretariat located in Washington, D.C. He has 20 years of experience in climate change and other global environmental issues. Before taking office as the Manager in 2017, he served as a lead adaptation expert of the Fund since 2009, playing a key role in building the Adaptation Fund's portfolio of concrete adaptation projects which currently consists of more than 125 projects and programmes, including more than 30 that are nationally implemented. He also led the development and implementation of the Fund's medium-term strategy, which sets out the Fund's ambitious vision of accelerating adaptation action, innovation, and learning.



Ciyong Zou, Deputy to the Director General and the Managing Director of the Directorate of Technical Cooperation and Sustainable Industrial Development, UNIDO

Mr Zou is also the Director General's Special Representative for the G77 and China. At UNIDO since 2013, Zou is the architect of UNIDO's Programme for Country Partnership, and has guided the Organization's field and strategic engagements. Before joining UNIDO, he performed multiple roles, including as Deputy Director General of International Department at the Chinese Ministry of Finance, Alternate to the Chinese Executive Director at the World Bank, and Global Environmental Facility Operational Focal Point for China.



Ute Klamert, Deputy Executive Director Partnerships and Advocacy WFP

Ute Klamert joined WFP as Deputy Executive Director for Partnerships and Advocacy in February 2019, leading the organization's engagement and resource mobilization activities with governments, United Nations agencies, private sector and other resource partners. In this role, expanding the partnerships and advocacy functional support to the WFP mandate, her priorities include diversification of funding sources by fostering engagement with International Financial Institutions (IFI) and by creating an enabling organisational environment for specific domains such as thematic funding and climate action financing. Ms. Klamert also drives corporate communications and advocacy efforts to further WFP's mission of 'saving lives, changing lives'.



Saliha Dobardzic, Senior Climate Change Specialist with the Adaptation Fund

Saliha coordinates Programming and Innovation, including over half a billion of dollars in funding requests annually and leading the development of the Fund's innovation program since joining the Fund in 2018. Prior to this role, she was a Senior Climate Change Specialist with the Global Environment Facility's climate change adaptation program, namely the Least Developed Countries Fund and Special Climate Change Fund, working on various strategic, technical, and policy aspects of \$1.4 billion program portfolio. Previously, Saliha worked on environmental, international waters, and integrated coastal zone management issues with the World Bank's MENA region.
