Decisions by CMP20, CMA7 and COP30 relating to the Adaptation Fund and Relevant Matters to be Considered by the Adaptation Fund Board

Strategic Issues

- The Adaptation Fund was established in 2001 by decision 10/CP.7 to finance concrete adaptation projects and programmes in developing country Parties under the guidance of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP) (Decision 10/CP.7 and Decision 28/CMP.1).
- In 2018, the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to this Agreement (CMA) decided that “the Adaptation fund shall serve the Paris Agreement under the guidance of, and be accountable to, the CMA with respect to all matters relating to the Paris Agreement, effective 1 January 2019, subject to decision on this matter made by the CMP”. The CMA also recommended to the CMP that “the Adaptation Fund shall exclusively serve the Paris Agreement once the share of proceeds under Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement becomes available” (Decision 13/CMA.1).
- In 2018, upon this recommendation by the CMA, the CMP decided that “the Adaptation Fund shall exclusively serve the Paris Agreement and shall no longer serve the Kyoto Protocol once the share of proceeds under Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement becomes available”, and that the Adaptation Fund shall continue to receive share of proceeds, if available, from activities under Articles 6, 12 and 17 of the Kyoto Protocol. The CMP also decided that the Adaptation Fund shall serve the Paris Agreement under the guidance of the CMA and be accountable to the CMA with respect to all matters relating to the Paris Agreement, effective 1 January 2019.
- The CMP and CMA, as a governing bodies of the Fund and its Board, provide guidance and/or mandates to the Adaptation Fund and its Board through their decisions taken at the annual climate change conference, which significantly affect the work program of the Adaptation Fund Board and its committees.

Purpose

1. This board document is to inform the Adaptation Fund Board (the Board) of decisions relating to or referring to the Adaptation Fund (the Fund), taken by the CMP at its 20th session (CMP20), the CMA at its 7th session (CMA 7), and the COP at its 30th session (COP30) in Belém, Brazil, in November 2025 and matters to be considered by the Board in response to such decisions. The Annex to this document contains key decisions by the CMP20, CMA7, and COP30 which provide

guidance, recommendations, or mandates to the Fund and its Board as well as a Secretariat's proposal for actions to be taken by the Board in response to the respective decisions.

Recommended Decision

2. Having considered document AFB/B.46/2 and its annex, the Adaption Fund Board decides to take note of the decisions relating to the Adaptation Fund that were taken by the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP) at its twentieth session, the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA) at its seventh session, and the Conference of the Parties (COP) at its thirtieth session.

Background

3. This is a standing agenda item considered by the Board at its first meeting after the annual climate change conference, in which the Board considers the decisions taken by the CMP, CMA and COP relating to and/or referring to the Fund and its Board.
4. At the Belém Climate Change Conference in November 2025, several decisions were taken relating to and/or referring to the Fund. These include: (i) CMP20 decision and CMA 7 decision on matters relating to the Adaptation Fund; (ii) CMA7 decision on Global Mutirão; (iii) CMA 7 decision on global goal on adaptation; (iv) CMA 7 decision on further guidance for the mechanism established by Article 6.4 of the Paris Agreement; (v) CMP20 decision on guidance relating to the Clean Development Mechanism; (vi) COP30 decision on Belém Gender Action Plan.
5. The attached Annex A compiles all decisions taken by CMP20, CMA7, and COP30 in November 2025.

Highlights the need for capacity-building for national accredited entities to improve access to Adaptation Fund funding windows and invites the Adaptation Fund Board to consider, as appropriate, developing a regional capacity-building programme focused on reducing access barriers, accrediting national entities and facilitating direct access with a view to shortening project initiation and approval times.⁵</p>	<p>Ongoing work. The Secretariat has conducted multiple capacity building workshops tailored to Implementing Entities’ needs, including project proposal write-shops for implementing entities. 19. Further invites the Adaptation Fund to support developing countries in implementing the United Arab Emirates Framework for Global Climate Resilience and in ensuring alignment of the Framework with national adaptation plans and monitoring, evaluation and learning systems as a way of scaling up the implementation of adaptation projects identified as priorities within national adaptation plans.

Ongoing work. The current funding proposal review process entails ensuring that proposals are aligned with key national documents including NAPs and other key strategic national and or regional documents as appropriate. Additionally, the Strategic Results Framework of the Adaptation Fund (SRF) has recently been revised to align better with the GGA, and the guidance document on how to apply the SRF also takes into account the GGA indicators. As part of the Secretariat’s monitoring, evaluation, and learning (MEL) capacity building plans, workshops with implementing agencies will help enhance their overall MEL capacity.

The publication “Alignment of Adaptation Fund Portfolio with National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) and Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs)” produced by the Fund in 2025 and presented to the Board as document AFB/EFC.36/5, indicated a high level of alignment between the Fund’s portfolio and countries’ NDCs and NAPs.

23. Requests the subsidiary bodies to undertake technical work on improving metadata and methodologies for the Belém Adaptation Indicators, to be considered by the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement at its ninth session (November 2027), including by establishing a technical taskforce to contribute to that work.

The Adaptation Fund Board, as a UNFCCC constituted body, may consider participating in the relevant work, as appropriate, taking into account the need to ensure that the Belem adaptation indicators do not become a barrier or be used as a condition for developing country Parties to access funding under the Convention and the Paris Agreement, per paragraph 7 of Decision -/CMA.7.

24. Invites the Adaptation Committee, the Least Developed Countries Expert Group and other relevant UNFCCC constituted bodies and representatives of relevant processes to participate in the technical work referred to in paragraph 23 above.

Agrees that work under the Baku Adaptation Road Map should include consideration of the elements outlined in paragraph 38 of decision 2/CMA.5, focus on implementation of the global goal on adaptation in line with Article 7, paragraph 1, of the Paris Agreement and be responsive to the impacts of the temperature goal referred to in Article 2, paragraph 1(a), of the Paris Agreement.</p>	<p>Through its project portfolio the Fund supports country driven projects that enhance adaptive capacity.
