Summary

This report has been prepared in response to the request in decision [1/CMP.3](#) for the Adaptation Fund Board to report on its activities at each session of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP). It provides information covering 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026 on, inter alia, progress with respect to the Adaptation Fund, in particular on the implementation of tasks mandated by the CMP and the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA), and decisions and action taken by the Adaptation Fund Board to be noted by the CMP and the CMA, as appropriate. An addendum, covering 1 July to 23 October 2026, will be issued after the 47th meeting of the Adaptation Fund Board.

I. Introduction

A. Mandate

1. COP 7 decided on the establishment of the AF.¹ CMP 3 decided that the operating entity of the AF would be the AFB, served by a secretariat and a trustee.²
2. CMP 3 requested the AFB to report on its activities at each session of the CMP. It invited the GEF to provide secretariat services to the AFB and the World Bank to serve as the trustee for the AF, both on an interim basis.³
3. CMA 1 and CMP 14 decided that the AF shall serve the Paris Agreement under the guidance of, and be accountable to, the CMA with respect to all matters relating to the Paris Agreement, effective 1 January 2019. CMP 14 also decided that the AF shall continue to serve the Kyoto Protocol until the share of proceeds under Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement becomes available.⁴

B. Scope

4. This report details progress with respect to the AF, in particular relating to the implementation of tasks mandated by the CMP and the CMA, and recommendations for action to be taken by these governing bodies, as appropriate. Unless otherwise specified, the report covers 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026.

I. Recommendations for Action by the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol at its Twenty-First Session and/or the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement at its Eighth Session

5. The CMP and/or the CMA may wish to take note of the response of the AFB to the guidance provided at CMP 20 and CMA 7 (see Annex IX) and further invites the CMP and/or the CMA to take note of the following key AFB decisions and actions from the reporting period:
 - a) Approval of 14 single-country proposals for a total of USD 129.22 million and two regional (multi-country) proposals for a total of USD 36.64 million, and endorsement of a further 26 single-country concept notes for a total of USD 268.35 million and four regional concept notes for USD 93.01 million and 8 regional pre-concept notes for USD 173.31 million, as well as 31 project formulation grants for USD 3.62 million;
 - b) Approval of five fully-developed large innovation grants for USD 25 million, endorsement of two large innovation concept notes for USD 10 million, approval of one bundled innovation-learning grant for USD 750,000, one Adaptation Fund Climate Innovation Accelerator grant for USD 5 million, and approval of two project formulation grant for USD 300,000;
 - c) Approval of one single-country proposals for locally-led adaptation for USD 5 million, one regional fully-developed proposal for USD 30 million, endorsement of eight single-country concept notes for locally-led adaptation for USD 39.93 million, one regional concept note for USD 25.32 million, two single-country pre-concept notes for USD 10 million, one regional pre-concept for USD 30 million and approval of 12

project formulation grants for USD 1.94 million, and 2 LLA Aggregator grants for USD 22 million;

- d) Accredited 3 new NIEs and recredited 8 IEs (5 NIEs and 3 MIEs), plus considered a proposal for a new continuous accreditation model;
- e) Implemented 6 webinars and 2 workshops or seminars under the readiness program to build capacity of NIEs and RIEs to access AF resources and implement projects and programmes;
- f) Approved a new resource mobilization strategy for 2026-2029;
- g) Continued detailed consideration of the matter of the Fund's transition to exclusively serve the Paris Agreement;
- h) Approved a policy for the prevention of sexual abuse, exploitation, and harassment and progressed work on the updated environmental and social policy;
- i) Implemented its gender policy and action plan, including through use of its gender scorecard and analytical work;
- j) Implemented 47 communications and outreach activities in support of resourcing the AF;
- k) Supervised the implementation of the AF-TERG's second multi-year work program (2024-2027), including work on the mid-term review of the AF's MTS II, a comprehensive evaluation of the AF, an evaluation of the readiness programme, the AF's processes and systems supporting governance, and ongoing ex-post evaluations.

II. The Adaptation Fund Board

A. Board Meetings

6. The AFB held its 45th (9-10 October 2025) and 46th (6, 9-10 April 2026) meetings in person in Bonn, Germany. The agendas (including background documentation on the agenda items) and detailed reports on the meetings are available on the AF website.⁵

B. Election of the Chair and the Vice-Chair of the Adaptation Fund Board

7. At its 46th meeting, the AFB elected by consensus⁶ Ali Daud Mohamed (Kenya, Africa) as its Chair, and Francisca Molina (Spain, Western Europe and Others) as its Vice-Chair.

C. Composition of the Adaptation Fund Board

8. Several AFB members and alternate members were replaced as a result of the elections that took place at COP 30 and intersessionally. A list of the current AFB members and alternate members is contained in Annex I. Several positions remain vacant as no new representatives have been nominated.

D. Adaptation Fund Board Committees

9. The EFC and the PPRC met twice during the reporting period, in conjunction with the 45th and 46th meetings of the AFB. At its 46th meeting, the AFB elected Payai Manyok John (South Sudan, Africa) as Chair and Antonio Navarra (Italy, Western Europe and Others) as Vice-Chair of the Accreditation Panel. The AFB also elected Nina Alsen (Germany, Western Europe and Others) as Chair of the EFC and Diann C. Black-Layne (Antigua and Barbuda, Latin America and the Caribbean) as Vice-Chair of the EFC, Ana Luisa Aguilar Candanedo

(Panama, Latin America and the Caribbean) as Chair of the PPRC and Francisca Molina (Spain, Western Europe and Others) as Vice-Chair of the PPRC.

10. During the reporting period, the EFC considered the proposed FY27 budget for the AFB and its secretariat, the AF-TERG and its secretariat, and the trustee, and heard updates from the AF-TERG, including reports of the AF-TERG Chair on the AF-TERG work programme.

11. By the end of the reporting period, the PPRC had reviewed, under the regular window, 14 fully developed proposals for single-country projects and 26 single-country concept notes, two fully developed regional (multi-country) proposals, four regional concept notes, eight regional pre-concept notes, eight single country locally-led adaptation concept notes, one regional fully-developed locally-led adaptation proposal, one regional locally-led adaptation concept notes, two single-country locally-led adaptation pre-concept notes, one regional locally-led adaptation pre-concept note, two fully developed locally-led adaptation aggregator programmes, five fully developed large innovation proposals two large innovation concept notes, one fully developed AFCIA proposal, and one fully developed learning and innovation bundled grant, including 45 project formulation grant requests across all funding windows. Additionally, during the intersessional period between the 46th and 47th meetings of the AFB, the PPRC considered four regular single-country full proposals, two regular single-country concept notes, two single-country locally-led adaptation pre-concept notes, and one LLA aggregator programme that had previously been reviewed at the 45th meeting pending IE reaccreditation.

12. With the aim of enhancing the efficiency of the project approval process, the AFB continued to implement a review cycle that enables IEs to submit proposals for projects or programmes under all funding windows on a rolling basis.⁷

E. Adaptation Fund Accreditation Panel - Accreditation of Implementing Entities

13. The Accreditation Panel met twice during the reporting period and consists of the Chair and Vice-Chair, both of whom are AFB members, and four independent expert members.

14. The AFB considered the recommendations of the Accreditation Panel and accredited three NIEs (EIF, Nambia, BOI, Nigeria, and RSPN, Bhutan) and reaccredited three MIEs (WFP, IFAD and FAO). The Panel also reaccredited 5 IEs during the reporting period: South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI), South Africa; National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD), India; Planning Institute of Jamaica (PIOJ), Jamaica; Ministry of Planning and International Cooperation (MOPIC), Jordan; National Environment Management Council (NEMC), United Republic of Tanzania.

15. At the end of the reporting period, there were 39 NIEs, 9 RIEs and 14 MIEs, including 12 NIEs in the LDCs and 7 NIEs in SIDS. As of 30 June 2026, 17 applicant NIEs in the LDCs and 14 in SIDS were pursuing accreditation. Of the 62 accredited IEs as of 30 June 2026, 42 IEs (23 NIEs, 6 RIEs and 13 MIEs) had been reaccredited. A list of the accredited IEs is contained in Annex III.

III. Work Undertaken During the Reporting Period – Funding for Concrete Adaptation Projects

A. Adaptation Fund Board Funding Decisions

16. CMP 11 requested the AFB to provide in its reports to the CMP further information on the status of the AF pipeline, including projects at different stages of development.⁸ The requested information is contained in Annex VIII.

17. Demand and need for AF funding continued to grow. The active pipeline of project and programme proposals submitted in the past 18 months but not yet approved amounted to USD 1.89 billion (see Annex VIII, table VIII.3).

18. At its 45th meeting, the AFB approved six single-country fully-developed proposals for funding for a total amount of USD 30.6 million, endorsed 11 single-country concept notes totalling about USD 103.17 million. The single-country proposals approved for funding were for Armenia, Ethiopia, Indonesia and Grenada. Additionally, 8 project formulation grants for projects that had been submitted by NIEs, RIEs and MIEs totalling USD 1.034 million was approved.

19. The AFB also endorsed five regional pre-concept notes for a total of USD 106.55 million along with the approval of 4 PFGs totalling USD 119,000. The AFB also endorsed two LLA single country pre-concepts for USD 9.9 million and approved 2 PFGs totalling USD 80,000, approved one LLA Aggregator proposal for USD 10 million, one single large innovation fully-developed proposal for 5 million, three regional large innovation proposals for USD 14.99 million and one AFCIA fully-developed proposal for 5 million. A bundled innovation-learning grant for USD 750 thousand was also approved. The above approved proposals and endorsed concepts are for food security, ecosystem-based adaptation, agriculture, development, water management, disaster risk reduction, early warning systems, forests, transboundary water management, and multisectoral projects.

20. The AFB at its 46th meeting approved four single-country proposals for funding totalling USD 52.65 million and two regional (multi-country) proposals for funding totalling USD 36.64 million at its meetings during the reporting period (see Annex VII). The single-country proposals approved for funding were for Mauritania, Malawi, Nepal and Zambia. The two regional proposals were for Angola and Namibia and Bangladesh and Nepal.

21. Also at its 46th meeting, the AFB endorsed 13 single-country project concepts, for Belize, Kenya, Peru (two proposals), United Republic of Tanzania, Bolivia (Plurinational State of), Cambodia, Ecuador, Jordan (two proposals), Malaysia, Sri Lanka and Zambia for funding totalling USD 151.99 million, at its meetings during the reporting period. Additionally, 12 project formulation grants for projects that had been submitted by RIEs and MIEs totalling USD 1.7 million was approved.

22. The AFB at its 46th meeting endorsed from its funding window for regional projects and programmes, four concept notes totalling USD 93.01 million for regional projects in Bolivia (Plurinational State of), Brazil, Chile; Côte d'Ivoire and Ghana; Ethiopia and United Republic of Tanzania; and Malaysia and Philippines. Additionally, four project formulation grants for projects that had been submitted by RIEs and MIEs totalling USD 501,000 was approved.

23. The AFB also endorsed three pre-concepts totalling USD 66.75 million for regional projects in Bangladesh and Bhutan; Jordan and Lebanon, Mongolia and Pakistan. The AFB approved USD 99,000 in project formulation grants for the endorsed pre-concepts. The approved fully developed proposals and endorsed pre-concepts and concepts cover agriculture, disaster risk reduction and early warning systems, ecosystem-based adaptation, food security, innovation in adaptation finance, multisectoral projects, rural development, urban development, and water management (including transboundary water management) (see Annex VII, figures VII.1–VII.2).

24. The AFB at its 46th meeting also approved one single-country proposals for locally-led adaptation for USD 5 million for Bangladesh, endorsed eight single-country concept notes for locally-led adaptation for Costa Rica (two proposals), Kenya, Nepal, South Africa, United Republic of Tanzania, Uganda and Vanuatu for USD 39.92 million, and approval of eight project formulation grants for USD 1.59 million.

25. The AFB at its 46th meeting approved one regional locally-led adaptation fully-developed proposal for Eswatini, Zambia and Zimbabwe for USD 30 million. The AFB endorsed one regional locally-led adaptation proposal for Antigua and Barbuda, Belize, Grenada, Jamaica, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines for USD 25.31 million and approved the associated project formulation grant for USD 194,324. One regional locally-led adaptation pre-concept note proposal was endorsed for Fiji, Malaysia, Maldives, Mongolia, Pakistan, Solomon Islands, Sri Lanka and Viet Nam for USD 30 million and the associated project formulation grant of USD 68,000 was approved.

26. The AFB at its 46th meeting approved one large innovation project for USD 5 million for Somalia and endorsed two large innovation project concept notes for Costa Rica and Uruguay for USD 10 million. Additionally, two project formulation grants for projects that had been submitted by NIEs totalling USD 300,000 was approved.

27. During the inter-sessional period AFB46-47, the AFB Board approved four single-country fully-developed proposals for USD 45.99 million. It also endorsed two single-country concept notes valued at USD 13.18 million and approved one project formulation grant associated with a single country concept note for USD 91,800. Two LLA single-country pre-concept notes were also endorsed during the inter-sessional period valued at USD 9.99 million and two project formulation grants associated with the LLA single country pre-concept notes for USD 80,000 were approved. Additionally, one LLA aggregator proposal for USD 12 million was approved. The proposals approved and endorsed during this period cover agriculture, water management, disaster risk reduction and/or are multi-sector. The single-country proposals approved proposals were for the Dominican Republic, Egypt, Mexico, Kenya and the aggregator proposal covered Latin America and the Caribbean region.

28. In response to suggestions and requests made by civil society and non-governmental organization observers, all project and programme proposals are posted on the Fund's website as they are received and interested stakeholders may send comments electronically. Comments on proposals submitted to the AFB through its secretariat⁹ are posted on the website and are considered by the PPRC. During the reporting period comments were received for five proposals and were addressed prior to submission to the PPRC.

B. Project and Programme Portfolio Monitoring

29. As of 30 June 2026, 123 developing country Parties had submitted single-country proposals (concepts or fully developed proposals), of which 95 have at least one project approved by the AF to date. These single-country projects fall under the current funding cap of USD 40 million per country. Of the 123 developing countries, 68 have requested and/or accessed a total funding of USD 10 million or more.

30. During the reporting period a total of 27 new projects were approved, increasing the total projects approved since it's the Fund's inception, to 226 concrete adaptation projects. As of 30 June 2026, a total of 118 projects were under implementation, including 6 projects that began implementation during the reporting period. Additionally, 52 projects have been closed, of which 7 were completed during the reporting period. Also, within the reporting period, 2 additional projects completed implementation but are yet to fully close¹⁰. The remaining 51

projects have not yet started implementation and are at various stages of inception (see Annex VIII for further information on the status of the AF portfolio).

31. By the end of the reporting period, a total of USD 1643.8 million had been disbursed to the 226 projects approved since the operationalization of the AF, including USD 195.6 million during the reporting period. Africa accounts for the largest amount of grant funding approved thus far, with 76 projects accounting for USD 651.7 million in grants (39.6 per cent); followed by Asia and the Pacific, with 75 projects accounting for USD 447.2 million in grants (27.2 per cent); Latin America and the Caribbean, with 52 projects accounting for USD 391.6 million in grants (23.8 per cent); and Eastern Europe, with 15 projects and approved funding of USD 88.4 million in grants (5.4 per cent). Eight MIE global aggregator for innovation programmes totalling USD 64.7 million are operated by UNDP, UNEP (which operates a two-phase programme), UNIDO, WFP and CAF, and four programmes administered by UNDP, UNEP, WFP are under implementation.

32. By sector, the largest grant amount is allocated to projects in multisectoral projects, with USD 365.7 million of funding approved to date (22.2 per cent), followed by agriculture, with USD 244.5 million approved (14.9 per cent); food security with USD 232.9 million of funding approved (14.2 per cent); disaster risk reduction and early warning systems, with USD 192.8 million (11.7 per cent); water management, with USD 148.8 million (9.1 per cent); rural development, with USD 113.7 million (6.9 per cent); coastal management, with USD 88.5 million (5.4 per cent); disaster risk reduction, with USD 66.7 million (4.1 per cent); urban development, with USD 51.4 million (3.1 per cent); innovation in adaptation finance, with USD 50.0 million (3.0 per cent); transboundary water management, with USD 42.8 million (2.6 per cent); ecosystem-based adaptation, with USD 35.4 million (2.2 per cent); and forestry, with USD 9.2 million (0.6 per cent) (see Annex VII, figure VII.3). These figures are included in the fifteenth annual performance report of the AF, covering 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026, which will be considered by the AFB at its 46th meeting.

33. In line with the mandate of the AF to finance concrete adaptation projects, since 2010 the AF has consistently channelled grant funding towards outcome 4 of its strategic results framework, namely “Increased adaptive capacity within relevant development sector services and infrastructure assets”, with total funding of USD 287.2 million (26.3 per cent of the portfolio), followed by outcome 5, “Increased ecosystem resilience in response to climate change and variability-induced stress”, with total funding of USD 219.6 million (20.1 per cent of the portfolio) and outcome 6, “Diversified and strengthened livelihoods and sources of income for vulnerable people in targeted areas”, with total funding of USD 207.5 million (19.0 per cent of the portfolio). Many of the activities associated with concrete adaptation projects fall within these three outcome areas, such as restoration of ecosystem services, investment in coastal protection infrastructure, or increased access to irrigation water and production schemes.

34. In response to the growing emphasis on monitoring progress toward the Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA), the Adaptation Fund has undertaken an initial exercise to map its portfolio against the seven thematic areas identified under the GGA. This effort aims to better understand how Fund-supported projects contribute to the GGA thematic areas: Food and Agriculture; Water Supply and Sanitation; Ecosystems and Biodiversity; Infrastructure and Human Settlements; Poverty Eradication and Livelihoods; Health; and Cultural Heritage. Recognizing the inherently cross-sectoral nature of adaptation interventions, projects were assigned both a primary thematic area, representing the main focus of adaptation activities, and one or more secondary thematic areas, capturing additional adaptation benefits and impacts delivered by the intervention.

35. The results highlight the broad contribution of the Adaptation Fund portfolio across multiple adaptation priorities as in the below table:

36. The mapping shows that Food and Agriculture represents the most common primary area of intervention, accounting for 38 per cent of the portfolio (86 projects), underscoring the Fund's longstanding support for climate-resilient agricultural systems, sustainable land management, and food security. Water Supply and Sanitation is the second most prevalent primary area, representing 26 per cent of projects (58 projects), reflecting the critical role of water security in climate adaptation efforts. Ecosystems and Biodiversity and Infrastructure and Human Settlements account for 17 per cent and 16 per cent of primary classifications, respectively, demonstrating the Fund's investments in ecosystem-based adaptation approaches and climate-resilient infrastructure.

37. When secondary contributions are considered, the multidimensional nature of adaptation becomes more evident. Poverty Eradication and Livelihoods emerges as the most frequently represented thematic area overall, appearing in 216 projects either as a primary or secondary classification. Similarly, Water Supply and Sanitation (212 projects) and Ecosystems and Biodiversity (200 projects) feature prominently across the portfolio, reflecting the interconnected character of adaptation actions and their ability to generate benefits across multiple sectors.

38. The exercise also demonstrates that thematic areas such as Health and Cultural Heritage, while rarely constituting the primary focus of adaptation projects, are often addressed indirectly through broader resilience-building interventions. This suggests that many Adaptation Fund projects generate important co-benefits for public health, social well-being, and cultural preservation even when these outcomes are not identified as the principal objective.

C. Workplan and Budget of the Adaptation Fund Board, Secretariat, AF-TERG, and Trustee

39. At its 46th meeting, the AFB considered and approved resources to support the work of the AFB, secretariat, AF-TERG and its secretariat, and the trustee for fiscal year 2027 ending on 30 June 2027 (see Annex II).¹¹ The estimated administrative budget requirement approved for fiscal year 2027 for the AFB, its secretariat, the AF-TERG and its secretariat, and the trustee is USD 19,123,721, an increase of 8.9 per cent compared with the previous year. The approved budget accommodates the implementation of a series of activities under the MTS2, evaluation programme implementation of the AF-TERG, and the trustee's operations. Additionally, the AFB approved USD 1,974,000 for the World Bank's hosting fees for fiscal year 2027 for the AFB, its secretariat and its evaluation function¹².

IV. Resources for the Adaptation Fund

A. Resources in the Adaptation Fund Trust Fund

40. As at 30 June 2026, the trustee had sold 37.14 million CERs, generating revenue of USD 222.33 million. Receipts from the monetization of CERs amounted to USD 2.66 million during the reporting period, and 10.27 million CERs were still available to be sold, in accordance with the CER monetization programme guidelines adopted by the AFB.¹³ As at

the same date, the AFB had instructed the trustee to transfer USD 994.01 million to IEs (see Annex XI). Funds available for new funding approvals amounted to USD 553.42 million.

B. Financial Support Provided to the Adaptation Fund Board

41. The AFB, at its 39th meeting, approved the resource mobilization strategy and action plan for the AF for 2022–2025.¹⁴ The approved resource mobilization strategy and action plan include progressive resource mobilization targets, taking into account relevant goals for increasing the level of global adaptation finance. During the reporting period, the AFB mobilized resources and received support for implementing its mandate as per its resource mobilization strategy. At its 46th meeting in April 2025, the AFB approved a new resource mobilization target from a floor of USD 300 million for 2025.¹⁵

42. At its 46th meeting in April 2026, the AFB approved a new Resource Mobilization Strategy for the period 2026 to 2029 (RMS-3).¹⁶

43. The annual high-level contributor dialogue of the AF was held at COP 30 on 17 November 2025, co-hosted by the COP 30 Presidency. The high-level dialogue was opened by the AFB Vice-Chair followed by high-level interventions from the COP 30 Presidency, the COP29 Presidency, the UNFCCC Secretariat, and contributor and recipient governments including from LDCs and SIDS, as well as representatives of civil society. Participants voiced their support for the AF as a key channel of adaptation finance to developing countries under the Convention and the Paris Agreement. Contributor governments also made new announcements of financial support for the Fund towards the AFB's resource mobilization target. Pledges announced include those from Germany (69.36 million USDeq), Spain (23.12 million USDeq), Sweden (13.81 million USDeq), Ireland (11.56 million USDeq), Luxembourg (5.78 million USDeq), Switzerland (5.26 million USDeq), Belgium's Brussels Region (3.32 million USDeq), Belgium's Walloon Region (3.47 million USDeq), Portugal (1.16 million USDeq), Republic of Korea (0.82 million USDeq) and Iceland (0.67 USDeq). The AFB will organize its annual high-level contributor dialogue for 2026 in conjunction with COP 31.

44. In the calendar year 2025, a total of USD 138.24 million was collectively pledged by 11 national and subnational contributor governments. This includes annual tranches for 2025 from three multi-year pledges. The AFB's annual resource mobilization target from a floor of USD 300 million could not be met.

45. In addition to voluntary government contributions, the AF mobilized resources from private and alternative sources of funding, including revenues from CER sales and USD 1,424.19 from private donations made through the donate link via the UN Foundation (UNF).¹⁷

46. To help meet the 2025 resource mobilization target, the AFB has been taking steps to communicate the target to existing and potential contributor governments, including through targeted bilateral meetings, visits to contributor governments, virtual exchanges, and high-level briefings for contributor governments during New York Climate Week in September 2025 and SB64 in June 2026. The AFB continues to advocate for multi-year commitments in its engagements with existing and potential new contributor governments to enhance the predictability of AF resource mobilization.

47. The AFB, through its secretariat and the trustee, has been actively engaging with the UNFCCC secretariat and other stakeholders on the timely development of a strategy for monetizing A6.4ERs and on ongoing developments in the area of transactions under Article 6.2 Paris Agreement with the potential to mobilize voluntary contributions from such transactions for the AF.

48. The AF continues to raise awareness of its ability to receive contributions from sources other than government funding, such as foundations, charitable organizations, non-profit organizations, private individuals and private sector companies. The AFB, through its secretariat, is continuing its engagement with the United Nations Foundation to facilitate the transfer of financial donations received through the online donation link to the AF Trust Fund. The AFB regularly promotes opportunities for the private sector and individuals to donate to the AF Trust Fund, either through the online donation link or directly to the AF Trust Fund, in line with the procedural steps established by the AFB for receiving contributions from sources alternative to government funding.¹⁸

V. Work Undertaken During the Reporting Period - Policy

A. Board Support to the Transition of the Adaptation Fund to Exclusively Serve the Paris Agreement

49. The AF started serving the Paris Agreement under the guidance of, and being accountable to, the CMA with respect to all matters relating to the Paris Agreement, effective 1 January 2019,¹⁹ and shall serve the Paris Agreement exclusively once the share of proceeds under Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement becomes available.²⁰ CMP 14 and CMA 1 decided that the AF shall continue to receive the share of proceeds, if available, from activities under Articles 6, 12 and 17 of the Kyoto Protocol, and that it would be financed from the share of proceeds from the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement and from a variety of voluntary public and private sources.²¹

50. The AFB continued to consider arrangements for the transition of the AF from the Kyoto Protocol to the Paris Agreement at its 45th and 46th meetings. At its 45th meeting the AFB considered a draft new Terms and Conditions for Trustee Services to the Adaptation Fund prepared by the Trustee, providing comments to this new draft and reaffirming decision 1/CMP.14 which states that the Fund shall continue to receive share of proceeds, if available, from activities under Articles 6, 12 and 17 of the Kyoto Protocol. The AFB also took note of the progress made during its 45th meeting on the memorandum of understanding regarding secretariat services provided by the GEF to the AFB. The AFB expressed its intention to further revise and finalize the draft Terms and Conditions and the draft MOU regarding secretariat services, as appropriate, in light of any additional guidance that may be proposed by the CMP and/or CMA.

51. At its 46th meeting, the AFB heard an update from the Secretariat on work to date to finalize the draft memorandum of understanding regarding secretariat services provided by the GEF to the AFB, and heard an update from the Trustee regarding work to date to further finalize a draft new Terms and Conditions for trustee services to the AFB. The AFB also received an in-depth briefing from the UNFCCC Secretariat regarding the operationalization of the Article 6 mechanism for both Article 6.4 and 6.2 shares of proceeds as it relates to the Adaptation Fund. The AFB took note of these updates and expressed its continued intention to further revise and finalize the draft terms and conditions for trustee services and the draft memorandum of understanding regarding Secretariat services, taking into account any additional guidance that may be provided by the CMP and CMA.

B. Project Legal Agreement, Environment and Social Policy, and SEAH

52. At its 46th meeting, the AFB requested the secretariat to consult with those MIEs accredited to the AF that were MDBs to identify and clarify concerns raised by them regarding the AF's legal agreement, during the intersessional period between the 46th and 47th meetings of the AFB and to present an analysis of issues identified through the consultation, including

the feasibility and any policy and legal implications of the draft amendments proposed by the MDBs, for the AFB's consideration at its 47th meeting. The AFB also considered a draft Environmental and Social Policy and decided to further provide additional comments intersessionally and consider a revised policy reflecting the AFB's comments during the AFB's 47th meeting. The AFB also approved a policy on safeguarding against sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment (SEAH).

C. Civil Society Engagement

53. Civil society organizations are actively engaged in the work of the AF through a regular dialogue with the AFB during Board meetings, consultations on project proposals and other Board documents, and consultations on project design and implementation. The MTS affirms that civil society contributes to the AF in a variety of ways, including in terms of mobilizing resources, providing real-time updates on and assessments of supported projects, and gathering input from intended beneficiaries.

54. Regular dialogue between the AFB and civil society organizations has been part of the standing agenda since the 12th AFB meeting and continued at its 45th meetings providing an opportunity for the AFB to listen to proposals and receive feedback on issues on the agenda and for the exchange of views.

55. At its 46th meeting, the AFB discussed its agenda options to update the draft of the AF vision and guidelines for enhanced civil society engagement based on the AFB's decision to establish an "active civil society observer" status at its 42nd meeting²² and reflective of recommendations from the AF civil society network. The AFB decided to continue the matter at its 47th meeting.

D. Carbon footprint of the Adaptation Fund

56. In 2023, the AFB published a report on the carbon footprint of the operations of the AFB secretariat for fiscal year 2021 and 2022 for the first time and decided to do so annually, in conjunction with the annual performance report of the AF on the basis of the methodologies in the Greenhouse Gas Protocol. In 2025, the AFB published the report for fiscal year 2023 and 2024. The AFB is aiming to make the report more comprehensive as more data become available. It also considered the practices of other climate funds²³ for estimating the carbon footprint of funded projects and programmes.

VI. Implementation of the Medium-Term Strategy (2023–2027)

57. The AFB made progress in implementing its second MTS in line with its implementation plan.²⁴ The second MTS is aimed at further consolidating the comparative advantage of the AF and optimizing its impact. It is focused on financing adaptation action, innovation, and learning and sharing, while increasing ambition under each of these strategic pillars and strengthening the linkages and synergies between them. Further, the second MTS includes a strategic emphasis on locally led adaptation focused on scaling up adaptation projects as a new cross-cutting theme.²⁵

A. Locally Led Adaptation

58. During the reporting period, the Adaptation Fund continued to operationalize and expand its Locally Led Adaptation (LLA) access. The Board approved two programmes under the LLA aggregator funding window, totalling USD 22 million, to channel grants to non-accredited entities including one global programme and one in the Latin America and the

Caribbean region. The Board also approved the first regional LLA programme, for USD 30 million and one single-country fully-developed proposal for USD 5 million. The Board endorsed eight single-country LLA concept notes for USD 39.93 million, one regional concept note for USD 25.32 million, two single-country pre-concept notes for USD 10 million, one regional pre-concept for USD 30 million, and approved 12 project formulation grants for USD 1.94 million. To support access to the LLA window, the secretariat also held a regional write-shop from 12 to 15 May 2026 in Manila, Philippines, on the margins of the twentieth International Conference on Community-Based Adaptation to Climate Change. The write-shop brought together 22 participants from 10 Asia-Pacific countries and provided national and regional implementing entities with hands-on training, case studies and technical guidance to strengthen proposals under the Fund’s LLA and regular funding windows.

B. Innovation

59. Under the innovation pillar of the second MTS, the work of the AF builds and expands on the work carried out under the first MTS, including implementation of the AFCIA. During the reporting period the AFB approved an AFCIA programme for the Pacific SIDS and considered two AFCIA proposals from CAF and UNDP that were among the IEs invited to submit proposals following a review of the second call for expressions of interest (EOIs) to join the AFCIA partnership under the second MTS.²⁶

C. Learning and Knowledge Products

60. The Paris Agreement places unprecedented emphasis on adaptation learning and sharing, especially by and with developing country Parties.²⁷ During the reporting period, the AFB through its Secretariat implemented a number of activities and several products under the learning and sharing pillar of the second MTS in support of access to and implementation of AF funds:

- a) A virtual training course on the bundled learning-innovation grants window of the AF, aimed at NIEs and stakeholders interested in submitting proposals through this modality. The course is available in English, Spanish and French.
- b) A knowledge product that presents an overview of lessons learned and applied from 15 portfolio monitoring missions (PMMs) and the associated projects’ project performance reports with a focus on lessons related to community ownership, scalability and sustainability.
- c) A virtual training course on the preparation of project performance reports (PPRs), aimed at offering a step-by-step guidance to NIEs on completing the PPRs, including examples.
- d) A knowledge product that explores the extent to which Adaptation Fund projects are scaled up and the factors supporting or hampering the scale-up process, inclusive of case studies from the AF portfolio of scaled up projects.

D. Readiness Programme for Climate Finance

61. The Readiness Programme for Climate Finance provides support to developing countries. Under the second MTS the Fund is developing a strategy for the readiness programme to expand the scope and reach of readiness activities while strengthening the institutional and technical capacities of developing countries to access, manage, and scale climate adaptation finance and implement high-quality, country-driven adaptation projects and programmes.

62. During the reporting period, the AFB through its Secretariat undertook the following activities:

- a) The AFB approved two readiness grant proposals to support the delivery of technical assistance for IEs to comply with the Fund’s environmental and social policy and gender policy;²⁸
- b) A webinar on 6 August 2025 which provided guidance on transitioning the Designated Authority from an individual to an institutional entity to strengthen country ownership, institutional knowledge retention, teamwork, and access to Adaptation Fund resources.
- c) A webinar on 4 September 2025 which discussed outcomes of the AF Gender Scorecard Implementation and enhancement of Gender Mainstreaming Implementation and Reporting. The webinar strengthened gender mainstreaming and reporting practices by highlighting progress, identifying gaps, and providing guidance on applying the Gender Scorecard and improving the quality of gender data reported by implementing entities through the Fund’s project performance reports (PPRs).
- d) The annual climate finance readiness seminar for accredited IEs was held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia from 8 – 10 September 2025. The seminar facilitated experience-sharing, knowledge exchange, and learning among accredited national implementing entities to strengthen performance. The seminar brought together nearly 50 participants representing 28 NIEs across 26 countries;
- e) A webinar was held on 20 October 2025 which discussed the topic: Future-Proofing Adaptation: A Look at the Updated Strategic Results Framework. The webinar brought together over 90 participants from accredited implementing entities and Fund stakeholders to discuss the updated SRF, which strengthens disaggregated reporting on climate resilience, gender, vulnerable groups, innovation, and sector-specific results while aiming to improve coherence and reduce reporting burdens through updated guidance and capacity-building support;
- f) The 2026 country exchange was held in Panama 22 – 27 February 2026 under the theme Integrated Water Management, drawing on Fundación Natura’s Adaptation Fund-supported project, Adapting to Climate Change through Integrated Water Management in Panama. The exchange brought together participants from 14 countries across Africa, Asia, and Latin America;
- g) A webinar was held on 5 March 2026 to gather feedback from implementing entities on the draft guidance for the revised Strategic Results Framework. The revised framework streamlines reporting, and the updated guidance consolidates existing materials to improve, harmonize, and simplify monitoring and reporting requirements while aligning with the Global Goal on Adaptation.
- h) A webinar was held on 19 March 2026 titled: Unlocking Adaptation Innovation, which shared practical lessons and implementation experience from the Climate Innovation Accelerator. The webinar strengthened the capacity of national and regional implementing entities to design and develop adaptation innovation proposals using accelerators, incubators, and competition-based mechanisms that support locally led climate adaptation solutions.
- i) A webinar was held on 28 and 29 April 2026 which discussed anti-money laundering and countering the financing of terrorism requirements. The session provided a technical overview of accreditation-related compliance requirements, including documentation, governance arrangements, and institutional controls, while addressing common gaps.
- j) A regional write-shop was held 11-15 May 2026 in Manila, Philippines alongside the 20th International Conference on Community-Based Adaptation to Climate Change (CBA20) to strengthen the capacity of national and regional implementing entities from 10 Asia-Pacific countries to develop high-quality, fundable project and programme proposals under the Fund’s Regular and Locally Led Adaptation funding

windows. The write-shop included hands-on training, case studies, and technical guidance from AF staff.

- k) Continued collaboration between AF and GCF on delivering complementary support to the member driven CPDAE to develop an action plan and proposal for CPDAE Phase 2. The Secretariat financed and supported the CPDAE Annual Meeting held in Dakar, Senegal from 9-11 June. This meeting served as a strategic milestone as the CPDAE transitioned from its initial phase into Phase 2 implementation.

E. Gender Equality and Empowerment of Women and Girls

63. Advancing gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls is one of the four cross-cutting themes of the MTS and as such, guides the design of all AF activities and operations.

64. In terms of gender balance in the composition of the AFB, of the 32 member and alternate member seats, 11 (41 per cent) were held by women as at 30 June 2026 (5 of the seats were vacant).

65. Progress was made by the AFB in implementing the updated AF gender policy and gender action plan, including by strengthening efforts to enhance the institutional capacity of AF partners, particularly IEs, to integrate a gender-responsive approach into all stages of the project life cycle.

66. The AF has finalized a study on lessons learned from mainstreaming gender in the agriculture and food security sector. This study reviewed AF projects in Colombia, Ecuador, India, Egypt, Morocco and Georgia, highlighting how gender-sensitive approaches in agriculture and food security strengthens community resilience, food security and economic outcomes. The study will be published soon.

67. The FY25 Gender Scorecard Report was published, providing quantitative and qualitative analysis on gender mainstreaming in the project cycle, and informing learning, good practices, and targeted capacity-building.²⁹ During the reporting period, the FY26 AF gender scorecard was being implemented at entry and during implementation, drawing on project proposal and project and performance reports. The results are due to be included in the annual performance report of the AF in 2026 and will inform ongoing learning, identification of good practices and gaps, and the design of targeted guidance and capacity-building efforts.

68. The AF continued to strengthen gender capacity across the Secretariat and its partners through targeted trainings, workshops, webinars, and technical guidance, including support to NIEs on gender analysis, project design, and reporting to improve the quality of gender-responsive adaptation.

69. The annual performance report of the AF for fiscal year 2025 provides information on gender-sensitive and -responsive interventions in some projects approved during fiscal year 2025 (see Annex V for examples of such interventions in AF projects approved during the reporting period).

70. Collaboration on gender considerations with partner organizations, including other climate funds and the UNFCCC secretariat, continued, for example through co-organizing the Gender Capacity Building workshop for national gender focal points with GCF and CIF, UNFCCC, and the AF Secretariat's participation in the UNFCCC's workshop on financing implementation of the Belém Gender Action Plan.

F. Communications and Outreach

71. The AFB continued to implement its communications and outreach activities effectively, producing and disseminating accessible content and messaging across its

website, publications, and an expanded range of social media channels, including newly launched Instagram, Threads, and Bluesky accounts. Targeted communications, including 12 project stories, 8 press releases, 13 videos, and 14 Flickr photo essay albums, alongside flyers, brochures and other multimedia products, amplified beneficiary voices and highlighted adaptation results and lessons learned. These efforts were reflected in strong digital performance, with website pageviews increasing by 24.19 per cent to 838,691 and total users rising by 80.7 per cent to 291,000, indicating significant growth in reach and audience engagement. Media coverage also expanded to 1,934 mentions, driven largely by English-language outlets, with additional visibility in Spanish and French media. Social media performance showed continued growth, with total followers reaching 73,190 and engagement increasing substantially, outpacing content output. LinkedIn and Facebook remained the primary drivers of reach and interaction, while newer platforms supported ongoing audience expansion and experimentation. Overall, the data indicates that growth in web and social channels is outpacing traditional media coverage, broadening the Fund’s visibility beyond established outlets. The Fund also piloted several new media and social listening tools to monitor media and web engagement and continued to enhance its website through the introduction of a new country pages section and a more secure, modernized platform.

72. The Fund also strengthened its presence at COP 30 through the joint climate funds pavilion, showcasing Fund branding, imagery, videos and materials, The Fund’s main side event, joint events, several national and international media interviews in which the Fund’s impact was emphasized including one with national-level reporters representing 14 countries from the Earth Journalism Network, and other interviews with Climate Home News and various media, as well as participation in other high-level meetings and events, reinforced its visibility, complementarity, and stakeholder engagement. Further details are provided in Annex VI.

73. In addition to AFB meetings, Accreditation Panel meetings and readiness-related events organized by the AFB and its Secretariat, the Fund also showcased its work through a multimedia exhibit booth and promoting key events at Adaptation Futures and visited several Fund projects in various regions gathering communications materials to produce and showcase stories, videos and digital media. The AFB and its Secretariat and the AF-TERG and its Secretariat participated in the meetings and events listed in Annex IV.

G. Complementarity and Coherence with other Climate Funds and Operational Linkages and Relations between the Adaptation Fund and other UNFCCC Bodies

74. One of the cross-cutting strategic themes under the second MTS is strengthening complementarity, coherence and synergies with other adaptation funders and actors. The AFB continues to promote its complementarity and coherence with other multilateral climate funds (MCFs), such as the CIFs, the GCF, the GEF, and the FRLD, and its linkages with other UNFCCC bodies, such as the Adaptation Committee, the CTCN, the LEG, the NAP Task Force, the PCCB, and the TEC.³⁰

75. The AF continued its collaboration with the other MCFs (CIFs, GCF, GEF, and FRLD) in line with the joint declaration made by the MCF Heads on the MCF’s role of enhancing access and increasing impact.³¹ At COP30 the MCFs has a joint presence and outreach to Parties and stakeholders through a joint Climate Funds Pavillion and a joint Results Report on how MCFs’ financing delivers real outcomes for people, economies, and ecosystems.³² The MCFs Heads Committee met during the World Bank/IMF Spring Meetings in Washington D.C. on 16 April 2026 to advance collaboration in several priority areas such as joint results and indicators, capacity-building and country support, and joint visibility.

76. The AFB through its Secretariat continued its collaboration with the Fund for Responding to Loss and Damage (FRLD) in line with the letter of intent (LOI) which was signed by the heads of the two funds in January 2025³³ and includes as areas of collaboration knowledge and learning, innovation, and programming to support scalable solutions that address both immediate and long-term impacts of climate change. The manager of the AFB Secretariat participated in relevant high-level events hosted by the FRLD such as during New York Climate Week in September 2025.

77. The AFB, through its Secretariat, continued to collaborate with other multilateral climate funds on the monitoring and evaluation of results through the Climate Funds Collaboration Platform. During the reporting period, the Adaptation Fund (AF) hosted two in-person technical workshops with representatives of four other multilateral climate funds (MCFs): the Climate Investment Funds (CIF), Fund for Responding to Loss and Damage (FRLD), Global Environment Facility (GEF), and Green Climate Fund (GCF). FRLD joined as an Observer in the process. The workshops sought to further advance efforts for a harmonized approach to monitoring and reporting. These efforts represent a next step in developing a joint MCF reporting framework with aligned methodologies, as envisioned in the first Multilateral Climate Funds Joint Results Report published in November 2025. The joint work was reflected in the guidance document developed for the Adaptation Fund's Strategic Result Framework.

78. The AFB, through its Secretariat, also continued to collaborate with the GCF on several operational areas of complementarity and coherence, including the AF–GCF fast-track accreditation and reaccreditation framework, the scaling up of AF-funded projects and programmes by the GCF, and support for enhancing direct access through the CPDAE.

79. The AF continued its collaboration with the GCF on facilitating the scaling up of AF-funded projects by the GCF. Several such projects have already been scaled up by the GCF, and both funds have agreed to expand the potential scaling up to their entire portfolios through a joint AF-GCF scale up framework.³⁴

80. The AF through its readiness programme for climate finance continued its collaboration with the GCF on joint support to the Community of Practice of Direct Access Entities (CPDAE). The CPDAE is a member-driven network of National Implementing Entities (NIEs) of the AF and Direct Access Entities (DAEs) of the GCF, whose primary goal is to enhance the capacity of its members to access climate finance and effectively implement adaptation and mitigation projects. The CPDAE is undertaking a process to develop an action plan and proposal for Phase 2 of its implementation.

81. In line with the memorandum of understanding between the CMP and the GEF, the AFB Secretariat is hosted within the GEF Secretariat and provides Secretariat services to the AFB in a functionally independent and effective manner.³⁵ This promotes the exchange of information and knowledge and joint support to countries through complementarity financing such as project scale up. In the reporting period, the AF and GEF both attended an IMF organized country platform in The Gambia, including joint project field visits and joint meetings with relevant country focal points; the AF followed the GEF-9 Replenishment process; and the Manager of the AFB attended the 8th GEF Assembly in Samarkand, Uzbekistan to participate in sessions on MCF complementarity and coherence and MCF support for vulnerable countries. In addition, AF and GEF organized a series of conversations to consider ways to extend GEF partners by utilizing the existing accreditation process of the Adaptation Fund and adding the accredited Implementing Entities of AF to the future pool of GEF partners.

82. The AFB, through its Secretariat, engaged with the TEC and the CTCN on furthering collaboration on innovation. A representative from the AFB Secretariat participated in TEC 32 (held from 14 to 16 April 2026) in Songdo, Incheon, Republic of Korea. A representative from the Secretariat also participated virtually in a joint session with the Climate Technology Centre and Network (CTCN) Advisory Board held on April 17, 2026. The AFB Secretariat participated virtually in the CTCN 2025 SIDS Joint Programme: NDE Forum and Capacity Building on Co-creation for System Transformation (held from 1 to 5 December 2025). The AFB Secretariat participated in the 2026 CTCN Joint Programme: NDE Forum and Capacity Building for System Transformation in LAC (held from 19 to 22 May 2026) in San Ignacio, Belize.

83. The AFB is a partner organization in UN4NAPs, an initiative coordinated by the UNFCCC secretariat to respond to requests for technical assistance from any country that is in the process of formulating or implementing its NAP. The AFB, through its Secretariat, virtually attended the UN4NAPs meeting on 9 February 2026, which discussed how best to respond to countries' requests. In addition to providing input on capacity-building support available from the Adaptation Fund the AFB through its Secretariat also responded to several requests from countries that requested AF support for NAP implementation.

84. The AFB, through its Secretariat attended the Forty-ninth meeting of the Least Developed Countries Expert Group (LEG 49) from 24 - 27 February in Nouakchott, Mauritania. The AFB actively participated in the session "Assisting LDCs in accessing funding from the GCF, LDCF, AF and other sources for implementing the priorities identified in the NAPs". The participation strengthened awareness of the Adaptation Fund's support for NAP implementation, highlighted funding and strategic opportunities for LDCs, and fostered collaboration with LEG members and partners.

85. The AF is a member of the NAP Taskforce which supports developing countries in advancing NAP formulation and implementation. Through its Secretariat, the AFB attended the 2025 NAP Expo from 11–15 August in Lusaka, Zambia and the 2026 NAP Expo from 18-21 May in Kigali, Rwanda. The AFB engaged with developing countries to strengthen capacity for accessing climate finance for adaptation and NAP implementation and actively contributed to matchmaking approaches that help translate NAP priorities into fundable adaptation projects and programmes.

86. The AF is a member of the PCCB Network and a member of the informal coordination group (ICG) for capacity-building under the Convention and the Paris Agreement. In addition to attending ICG meetings, and relevant PCCB Network meetings, the AFB through its Secretariat also contributed to the PCCB Network newsletter sharing content on readiness and capacity-building support under the AF.

87. The AFB enhanced its collaboration with other climate funds and partner organizations, on promoting gender equality in climate action. The AFB, through its Secretariat, shared its experience of and lessons learned from gender mainstreaming in its operations and in AF-supported projects and programmes. It also discussed with other climate funds ways of enhancing complementarity and coherence of gender-related work among the funds.

VIII. Technical Evaluation Reference Group of the Adaptation Fund (AF-TERG)

88. This reporting period is the eighth year of operation of the Technical Evaluation Reference Group of the Adaptation Fund (AF-TERG).

A. Implementation of the Strategy and Work Programme of the AF-TERG

89. The AF-TERG progressed the following work elements:

- a) The new AF evaluation policy, effective October 2023, replaces the previous evaluation framework. To support its implementation, the AF-TERG has developed a total of 13 guidance notes, the most recent of which was published in June 2025. These notes are available in English, Spanish, and French on the AF website.

Capacity-building events on the evaluation policy were held during the reporting period, and online training courses for Implementing Entities are being developed, with a launch expected by September 2026;

- b) The second multi-year strategy and work programme of the AF-TERG provides for a comprehensive evaluation (CE) of the AF. The CE initiated in May 2025, is to be delivered by August 2026, sixty days prior to the 47th meeting of the AFB. The comprehensive evaluation adopts a ‘building block’ approach, incorporating the findings and results from evaluative and knowledge management work conducted by the AF since 2017;
- c) In March 2023, the AFB requested (Decision B.40/72) the AF-TERG to conduct a mid-term review (MTR) of the Fund’s Medium-term Strategy 2023-2027 (MTS2) and its implementation plan. This review started in February 2025 and was finalized in June 2026. It will serve as a key component of the CE;
- d) The thematic evaluation of the Fund’s readiness programme was completed in April 2026, allowing it to contribute to the development of the enhanced readiness strategy of the AF. Similar to previously completed thematic evaluations, this evaluation will also serve as a building block for the CE of the AF;
- e) As part of its second multi-year work programme, the AF-TERG, commenced the evaluation of the systems and processes supporting governance for enhanced performance of the Adaptation Fund (G/PS), following virtual consultations with Board members and other stakeholders and presentation at the 35th meeting of the EFC of the AFB. The work is expected to be completed by July 2026;
- f) The AF-TERG continues to regularly undertake ex post evaluations. Currently, the seventh and eight ex post evaluations are being conducted in Cuba and Ghana for strategically selected projects that completed implementation three to five years prior to the start of the evaluation. The aim is to provide insights into the sustainability of adaptation interventions and ensure accountability for results financed by the Fund. A new set of four ex post evaluations (ninth to twelfth) has been selected for implementation in 2027 covering projects in Belize, Peru, and South Africa;
- g) The AF-TERG continued to collaborate with the evaluation units of other multilateral climate funds. Notably, a joint pilot on the use of artificial intelligence (AI) was completed in June 2026. It focuses on the practical application of AI through a synthesis of evaluation data and evidence within the Forestry sector;
- h) The AF-TERG continued to participate for a third year, as an observer in the work of the United Nations Evaluation Group (UNEG) and participated in their Annual General Meeting in Rome in February 2026;
- i) In line with the requirements of the evaluation policy, the AF-TERG has launched an action tracker to monitor the implementation of Board decisions related to evaluation recommendations;
- j) Also, in line with the requirements of the evaluation policy, the AF-TERG in collaboration with the Secretariat has initiated annual monitoring of the evaluation policy implementation. The first monitoring report was presented to the AFB in October 2025. Additionally, in line with the provisions of the evaluation policy, the process of review of the evaluation policy will be initiated in the second half of 2026.

B. Budget of the Technical Evaluation Reference Group of the Adaptation Fund

90. At its 46th meeting, the AFB took note of an indicative budget for the operation of the AF-TERG and its secretariat during its second multi-year work programme and approved the proposed budget of USD 2,063,115 to cover the cost of operation of the AF-TERG and its secretariat for fiscal year 2027.³⁶

Examples of Gender-Sensitive and -Responsive Interventions in Adaptation Fund Projects under Implementation during the Reporting Period

91. Efforts to proactively address gender equality and women's empowerment in adaptation action have continued by ensuring that AF-funded projects and programmes include gender-responsive measures for effective, sustainable and equitable outcomes of adaptation action.
92. Examples of gender-sensitive and -responsive interventions in AF projects and programmes under implementation during the reporting period include:
 - a) Tailoring adaptation responses to gender-differentiated climate vulnerabilities through measures such as integrating gender analysis into planning,^{38 39} participatory approaches capturing women's priorities,⁴⁰ and measures that reduce time burdens and improve access to climate services;⁴¹
 - b) Strengthening women's participation, leadership and decision-making by promoting inclusive governance structures—such as setting participation thresholds in committees⁴² supporting women's leadership in resource management bodies,⁴³ and increasing women's representation and roles in community and technical decision-making processes;^{44 45}
 - c) Promoting women's economic inclusion and access to productive resources through targeted support—such as prioritizing women in grants and financing,⁴⁶ support women's access to land and provide labour-saving technologies,⁴⁷ and supporting women-led livelihood diversification and enterprise development through tailored and context-appropriate opportunities;⁴⁸

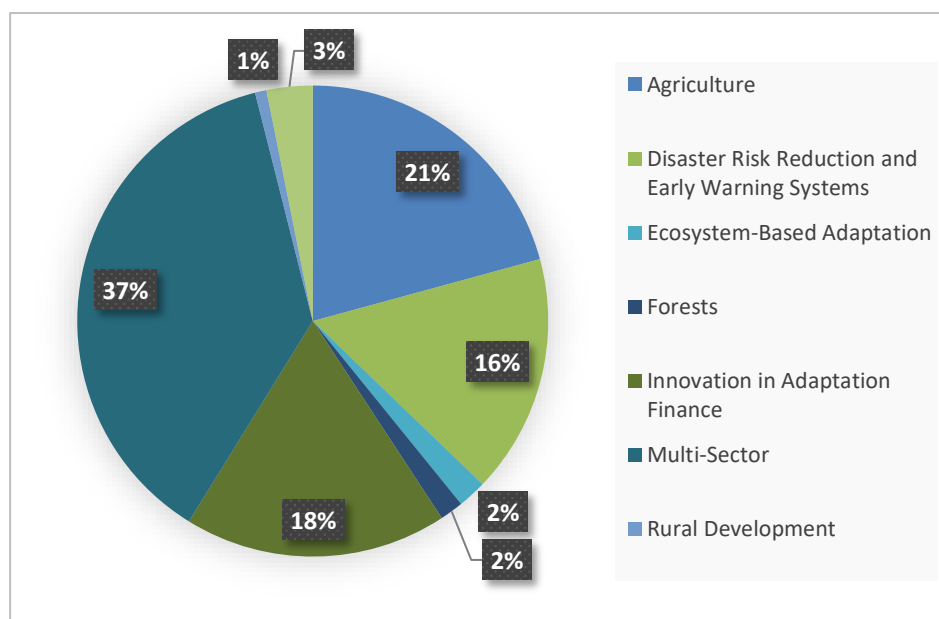

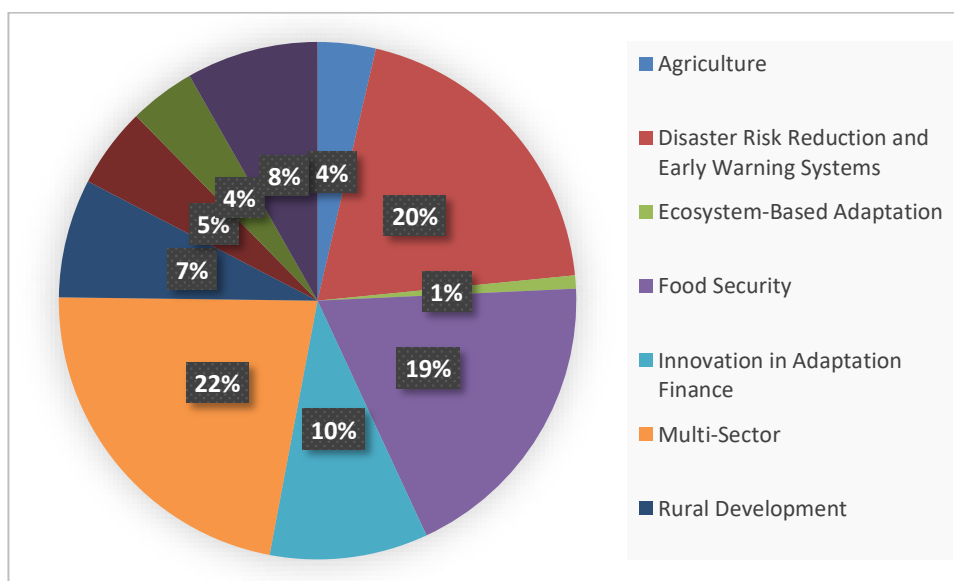
Fully developed project and programme proposals approved by the Adaptation Fund Board between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2026 shares by sector

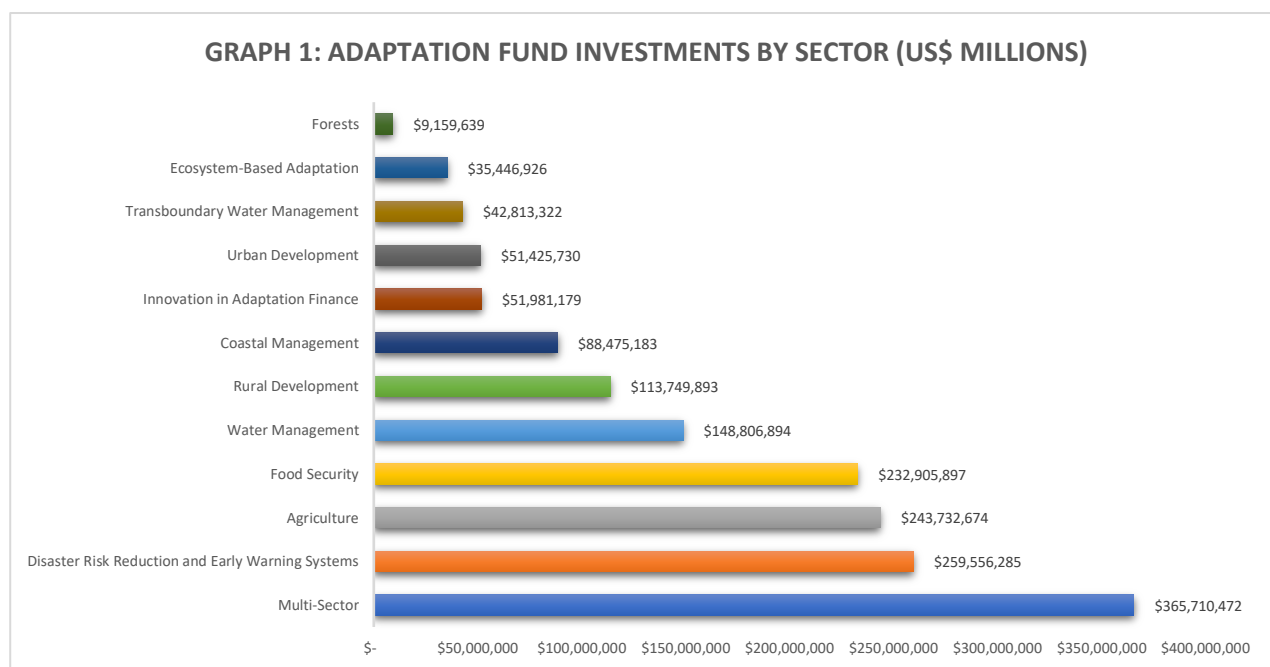
Project and programme pre-concepts and concepts endorsed by the Adaptation Fund Board between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2026, shares by sector

A. Introduction

1. This report is produced by the World Bank as trustee (“Trustee”) for the Adaptation Fund (AF) in accordance with the Trustee’s role in the Adaptation Fund Trust Fund as set forth under paragraph 23 in the Appendix of Decision 1/CMP.4 of the CMP.
2. The decision states that: “The Trustee shall prepare and furnish the Adaptation Fund Board with financial reports of the Trust Fund annually (or at any other such frequency agreed between the Trustee and the Adaptation Fund Board) and provide records and accounts of the Trust Fund for audit by its external auditors annually (or at any other such frequency agreed between the Trustee and the Adaptation Fund Board) in accordance with the policies and procedures of the Trustee. Furthermore, the Trustee shall prepare and furnish the Adaptation Fund Board with reports on the sale of the CERs for the Adaptation Fund and on the status of commitments and transfers of Trust Fund funds annually (or at any other such frequency agreed between the Trustee and the Adaptation Fund Board).”
3. The information contained in this Financial Report is based on financial information as of June 30 2026.

B. Adaptation Fund Trust Fund Summary as of June 30, 2026

Certified Emission Reduction (CER) Sales and Donations

4. Cumulative resources pledged to AF Trust Fund including CER sales proceeds amounted to USD 2,153.83 million as of June 30, 2026. USD 222.33 million was received from CER sales and USD 1,894.58 million was paid in donations, totaling cumulative receipts of USD 2,116.91 million as of June 30, 2026. Resources not yet received from Donors amounted to USDeq. 36.92 million, comprising USDeq. 26.22 million in pledges and USDeq. 10.70 million in donations receivable under the signed agreements.
5. An amount of USD 2.66 million was received from CER sales during fiscal year 2026.

Investment Income

6. As of June 30, 2026, investment income of USD 226.49 million was earned on the liquid balances in the AF Trust Fund. The AF Trust Fund liquid portfolio has returned 4.25% for fiscal year 2026.

Funding Approvals

7. Cumulative net funding decisions made by the AF Board through June 30, 2026, totaled USD 1,786.97 million, of which USD 1,653.04 million represents approvals for programs, projects, and fees, net of returned unused funds.

Cash Transfers

8. The Trustee has transferred a total of USD 1,106.84 million up to June 30, 2026, including USD 994.01 million related to programs, projects and fees, net of returned unused funds.

Funds Held in Trust

9. Funds Held in Trust reflect proceeds from CER monetization, donations received and investment income, less cash transfers made to date. Funds Held in Trust as of June 30, 2026 amounted to USD 1,233.55 million, excluding USD 3 million set aside for operational reserve.

Funds available for AF Board funding decisions

10. Funds available to support AF funding decisions amounted to USD 553.42 million as of June 30, 2026, which is a decrease of USD 10.39 million during fiscal year 2026.

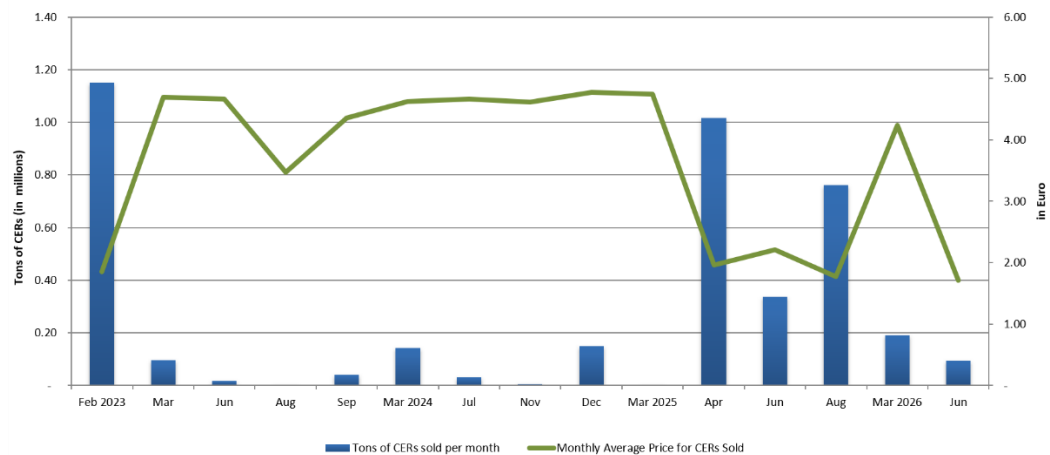

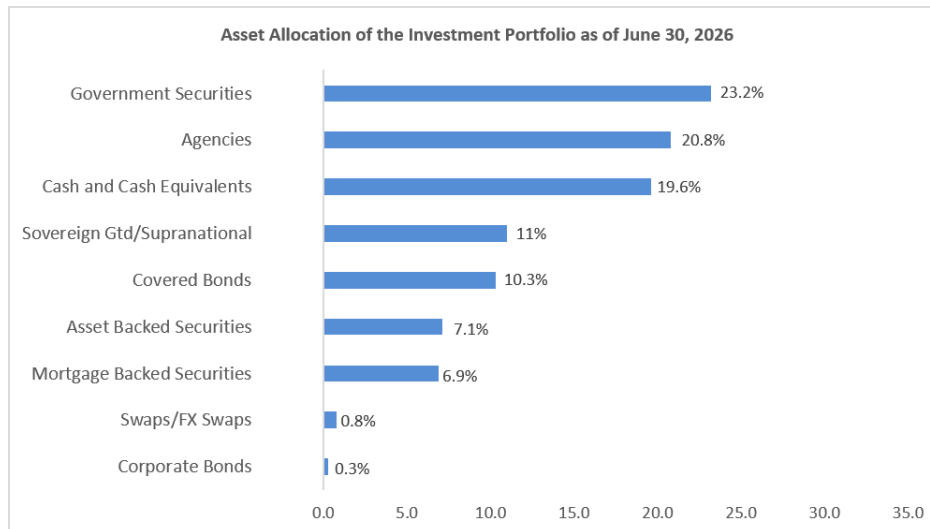

E. Asset Mix and Investment Income**ASSET MIX**

14. The undisbursed cash balance of the AF Trust Fund is maintained in a commingled investment portfolio (“Pool”) for all trust funds managed by the World Bank. AF Trust Fund assets are invested in short term, high quality fixed income portfolio with an investment horizon of up to one year.

15. The investment objectives for the AF Trust Fund are to optimize investment returns subject to preserving capital and maintaining adequate liquidity to meet foreseeable cash flow needs within a conservative risk management framework.⁵⁸

16. The portfolio allocation by asset class has the largest allocations to government securities and cash/cash equivalents.

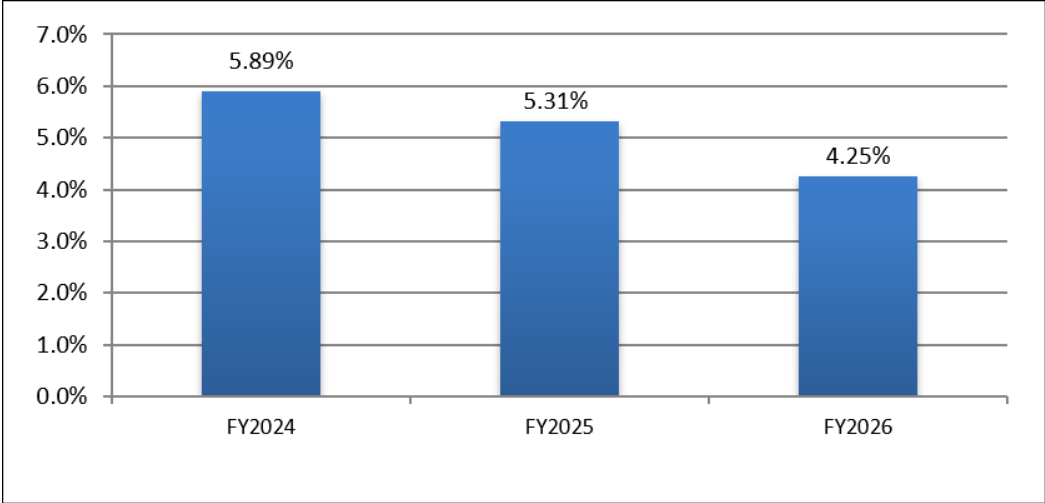


INVESTMENT RETURNS

17. The second quarter of 2026 was heavily influenced by shifting Middle East tensions, sharp rise in oil prices and the associated inflation risks. Inflationary pressures remained persistent during the quarter as reflected in higher-than-expected CPI readings and resilient labor-market data in both May and June. Accordingly, fixed-income markets faced substantial headwinds during the quarter, with short-term Treasury yields rising faster than long-term yields and the yield curve bear-flattening. As widely expected, the Federal Open Market Committee of the US Federal Reserve unanimously left the federal funds target range unchanged at 3.50% to 3.75%. However, at its June meeting it delivered a more hawkish message than markets had anticipated. Updated economic projections showed a higher inflation outlook, while the revised dot plot indicated that nine participants expected at least one additional rate increase in 2026.

18. The portfolio returns for the AF Trust Fund liquid portfolio (managed by the World Bank) or undisbursed cash balance during fiscal year 2026 was 4,25%.

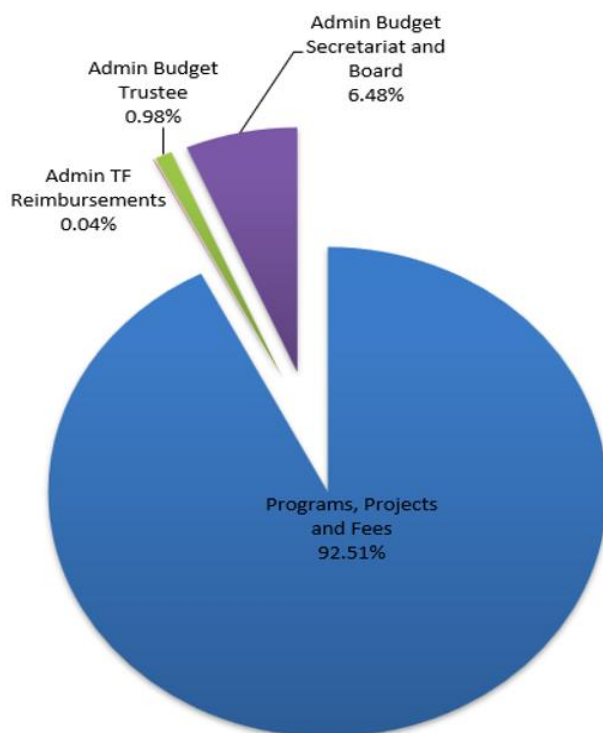

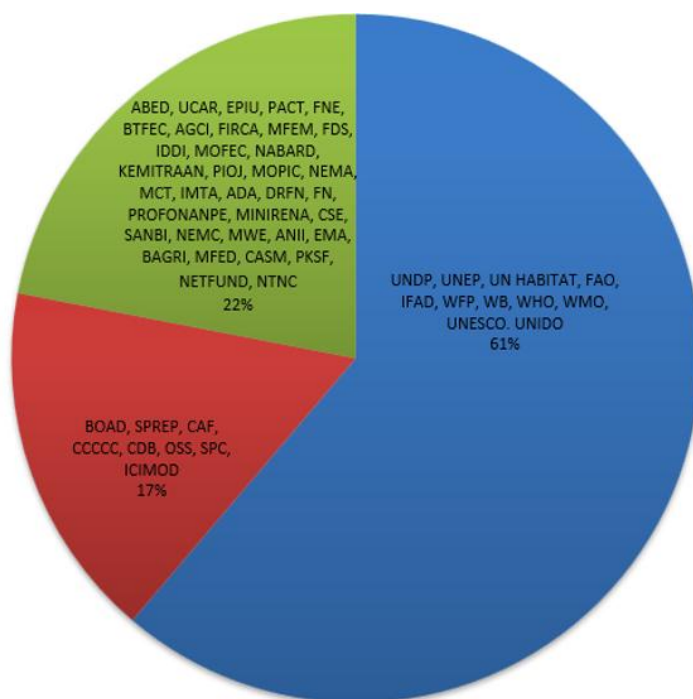
CUMULATIVE FUNDING DECISIONS
